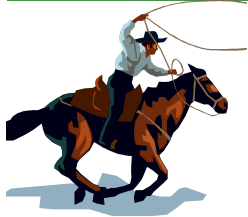

GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Minutes for March 11, 2013

President Terry Udell called the meeting to order at 6:40 pm following a pot luck dinner.

Guests present were **Linda Michaels** and **Kathleen Petersen**, guest speaker.

Program:

Rod Larson, also a Peace Corps volunteer, introduced **Kathleen Petersen** to this evening's group. Kathleen, at age 59, headed off to the Kyrgyz Republic in 2005 to help fulfill the Peace Corps' mission as established in 1961 of helping people in other countries with their needs, promoting a better understanding of the American people and promoting a better understanding of the people being served. Volunteers must be 18 years of age. In 1961 there were 200,000 volunteers in 137 countries. Currently, the Peace Corps is working in 75 countries.

The Kyrgyz Republic is a landlocked country, roughly the size of South Dakota, known as the "Switzerland of Central Asia" with 80% being mountainous and the highest peak over 24,000 ft. 80% of the population is Muslim, with 17% being Russian Orthodox and 3% other. It's population was 5,496,737 in 2012 consisting of 64.9% Kyrgyz, followed by 13.6% Uzbek, 12.5% Russian, 1.1% Dungan, 1% Ukrainian, 1% Uygur and 5.7% other. Kyrgyz's median age is 25.2 yrs. with a life expectancy of 65.2 yrs. for males and 73.0 yrs. for females. Poverty is documented at 33% but most likely closer to 37% says Kathleen. The country became independent from the Soviet Union in 1991 and it's flag depicts a sun (it's center depicting the wooden crown of a yurt-a portable dwelling traditionally used by nomads) with 40 rays of light representing the 40 clans of Manas, a legendary hero who united 40 regional clans against the Uyghurs. Its government is secular and suffers from periodic presidential overthrows, the latest in 2010. Kyrgyz is located on the famous Silk Road. The climate is cold and windy much like Wyoming, U.S.A Unfortunately, it is the 2nd poorest country in Central Asia with few natural resources such as water, agriculture (livestock does well in the mountainous areas providing wool, meat and dairy products) of which only 8% is cultivated and gold mined by a Canadian firm provides which does provide jobs but the profits leave the country. Wildlife is diminishing quickly as the population feeds on it faster than the wildlife can reproduce. Lake Issyk-Keel is the 2nd largest alpine lake in the world at 2400 sq. miles but fishing has deteriorated due either to over fishing or an unknown damage to the lake. Manas United States Air Force Base is located outside of Bishkek, the capitol of Kyrgyzstan near the northwest border. This base is an important military fueling point for access to Afghanistan and a provider of jobs.

Kathleen says, typically, she'd fly from Denver into New York, on to London, Istanbul and finally 30-32 hours later arrive in Bishkek. Some roads are good but once you enter the mountainous areas they become rough and made of dirt. Traveling within the country is too expensive for the local people with most never leaving the place they were born.

Kathleen's first few months were spent with 2 different Host families paid to teach Kathleen the customs and language before moving on to fulfill her duties. The young Turkish "Host Mom" was an excellent cook and Kathleen never suffered from the food illnesses other volunteers did.

Kathleen's duties were mainly to write grants for various projects from playground equipment to work training programs such as computer training, welding, and hair beautician. Kathleen shared how her son's receipt from Star Bucks for \$28.00 was worth 40 times the U.S. value in the Kyrgyz Republic and could easily fund some of these much needed projects. Kathleen, also, started her own program "Collecting for Kids" by collecting anything usable from the belongings of volunteers returning home after their tour was over. She collected anything that would be thrown away, left behind, or willingly donated such as games, electronics, clothing and anything that still had a use. Kathleen spent time working on a Habitat for Humanity project during her stay. Other duties were to help place children in long and short term placements while working with a children's center, Children of Tien-Shan. She again enjoyed wonderful food from the Russian cook while working at this facility.

There are no refrigerators and little electricity making a woman's work very intense. Brooms keep the house clean, all clothes washing is done by hand and cooking is done over wood burning stoves (trees are not being replaced with seedlings). Felt made from the sheep is used for shoes and clothing. Typically, families do move from the main house to a cooler summer house, a yurt.

Weddings are a big celebration with the father-in-law escorting the bride from her home to her new home followed by the shooting of guns from roof tops. You'll most likely be offered horse meat at this celebration as it is a delicacy in this horse oriented country. However, Kathleen says she was told "don't eat the horse you ride".

Kathleen stayed to answer questions and explain the souvenirs she brought to share this evening.

- **Donna Logan** thanked members for sending in corrections concerning the directory. She has received more corrections so watch for continuing up-dated directory information. We have 4 new members giving a grand total of 54 members.
- **Tim Bolin** mentions 2 of our new members are the direct result of the Washington state exchange. We should use our out-going exchanges as a way to approach potential new members.
- March birthday members were not present to be recognized.
- An e-mail was received from **Joan Hughes** stating that she enjoyed the February meeting and is recovering from knee surgery performed earlier today.
- **Tim Bolin** learned that there is a \$50.00 per person fee when an exchange goes over 3 days within the U.S. and that all future E.D. positions must be approved by the club president followed up with the proper paperwork.
- **Terry Udell** received approval for an Australia & New Zealand out-going exchange.
- **Terry Udell** read a letter from **Barbara Clark**, his Canadian host on a previous exchange, sharing advice on how to keep a F.F. club vibrant and prevent the club from aging itself out of existence. Two major points of the letter are 1) be aware of the problem and 2) take action to prevent the problem.
